212 Programs and Services

212.1 Academic Technologies for Learning

Academic Technologies for Learning (ATL) is an academic unit with a mandate to support all Faculty at the University of Alberta. The mission of ATL is to facilitate effective teaching and learning, on and off campus, through reflective application of learning and teaching technologies. ATL provides a variety of services, including instructional design, research and evaluation support and faculty development programs, to academic departments and faculty developing new instructional approaches and products. 212.2 Adult Education

The Faculty of Extension provides continuing professional education for educators of adults from a wide range of public and private agencies, including business and industry, government departments, social service agencies, hospitals, community organizations, and educational institutions. These seminars and workshops serve instructors, trainers, staff development officers, counsellors, group leaders, curriculum designers and librarians alike. 212.3 Applied Sciences

Major program areas include Addictions Studies, Agriculture, Community Health, Construction Administration, Environmental Resource Management, Forestry, Health and Wellness, Horticulture, Land Use Planning, Maintenance Management, Medical Acupuncture, Occupational Health and Safety, Oilsands Technology, and Residential Interiors. 212.6 English Language Program

The English Language Program is designed to develop English language skills for non-native speakers who wish to improve their academic, social, and business command of English.

The program provides a multi-level intensive day program ranging from basic to advanced proficiencies in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Evening courses consist of programs in conversation, specialty courses in accent reduction, preparation for TOEFL, and preparation for ENGL 101.

Online delivery of the Local Government Certificate Program allows students to learn using the Internet through MuniMall.net. Internet studies supplement and enrich course curriculum and facilitate communications among instructors, students, and selected others.

Other Government Studies programs include the Elected Officials Symposium, and the Municipal Refresher Course. Commensurate with Alberta's triennial local government election cycle Government Studies sponsors a Returning Officers Training Program, a candidate orientation program, and The Art of the Possible—a major conference for newly elected municipal officials.

- The Information Technology Management Certificate develops the knowledge and tools needed to manage information and technology more effectively. Students learn how to keep pace with the rate of change in the information systems industry and anticipate future developments and trends.
- Web Builder is a diploma program that builds the skills needed to master the web. Students learn the foundations for designing a website, setting up a server, creating pages, setting up databases and writing the code to tie it all together.

212.14 Master of Arts in Communications and Technology (MACT)

This multidisciplinary Master of Arts in Communications and Technology (MACT) is intended to address a need among workers in a variety of positions and fields for systematic study of communications in their workplaces. Many of the issues in this area of study are related to the impact of modern communications technologies on the workplace. The program includes, therefore, a secondary focus on such communications technologies.

The intended audience is knowledge workers, who fill responsible positions in such fields as

- · communications
- promotions and marketing
- information resources
- human resources
- · international initiatives
- · art and design
- fund development
- · writing and editing
- · other knowledge sector fields

What these knowledge workers have in common is that they operate in environments in which productivity depends on effective communication, and in which much of this communication is mediated by advanced technologies.

The main mode of instruction in the MACT is collaborative asynchronous distance delivery. That is, the program uses technologies that permit its being accessed from the students' homes or workplaces at times of their own choosing, but also allow group work and other collaborative learning. The program also involves a significant component of face-to-face instruction and interaction, mainly during an annual three-week Spring Institute at the University of Alberta campus.

Courses are scheduled so as to permit completion of the entire program in a minimum of two years of part-time study. Prerequisites for entry into the program include a four-year degree from a recognized university, with a GPA of 6.5 (or equivalent) and at least three years of relevant experience in the work force.
